After Price Club merged with Costco in 1993 my father established a private charitable foundation. He and I then directed most of our work to philanthropy. In 1996 we decided to invest in the revitalization of an economically challenged multi-cultural neighborhood in San Diego. Our efforts in this community, City Heights, have involved building high quality affordable housing, funding educational and social programs and, initiating new and creative ways to improve people's lives such as School in the Park, an education program for inner city elementary school children which takes place at museums in San Diego's Balboa Park. Although much remains to be done, the quality of life in City Heights continues to improve year by year.

Based on my own experiences, I would encourage you to consider a career in business or the non-profit sector. You will find that your four years at Pomona College have prepared you well for success in either of these fields. And, you will discover that business and non-profits offer opportunities for creative and meaningful ways to deal with the challenges we face in a rapidly changing society.
