Fellowships, Scholarships, and Financial Aid

• The Paul & Daisy Soros Fellowships for New Americans

Funds up to two years of graduate study in the U.S. in any field. Applicants must either be naturalized citizens, U.S. citizens whose birth parents are not U.S. citizens, in possession of a green card, or have DACA status by the application due date. Graduating seniors and alumni who are no further than their first or second year of graduate study may apply.

Ford Foundation Fellowship Programs

The Ford Foundation Predoctoral Fellowships Program aims to increase the presence of underrepresented minorities on the nation's college and university faculties by offering pre-doctoral fellowships to members of the six minority groups most severely underrepresented in U.S. academia. The goal is to help outstanding students achieve their full potential as scholars and subsequently inspire others to follow academic careers in teaching and research. The program invites applications from seniors and currently enrolled graduate students who are either citizens of the U.S. or have DACA status and who are members of the following minority groups: Alaskan Native (Eskimo or Aleut), American Indian, African American, Mexican American/Chicano, Native Pacific Islander (Polynesian or Micronesian), and Puerto Rican.

• Davis Projects for Peace Grants

Funds grassroots projects anywhere in the world that focus on "conflict resolution, reconciliation, building understanding and breaking down barriers which cause conflict, and finding solutions for resolving conflict and maintaining peace." Applicants must apply through the Draper Center at Pomona. U.S. citizenship is not required. Freshmen, sophomores, juniors, or seniors may apply--as groups or as individuals.

Immigrant Justice Corps Fellowship

Immigrant Justice Corps will award Justice Fellowships to 25 recent law graduates and law clerks from around the country – individuals with tremendous talent and promise and a demonstrated commitment to provide legal services for the poor and for immigrants. We also select 10 Community Fellows — exceptional college graduates with the linguistic skills, passion and cultural competency to work in and with New York City's diverse immigrant communities. DACA students are eligible to apply.

<u>Newman's Own Fellowship</u>

Funds a 12-month paid position in the nonprofit sector to help create a more diverse pipeline of talent for this sector. Fellows are placed for a 1-year period at a host nonprofit organization that will provide them with hands on experience and give them exposure to leadership within these organizations. Fellows will work on key strategic initiatives at the host organizations and develop a better understanding of the sector. DACA students are eligible to apply.

• Princeton in Africa Fellowship

Princeton in Africa matches talented and passionate college graduates with PiA partners working across Africa for yearlong service projects. There is no citizenship requirement. The program is open to graduating seniors and young alumni from any accredited college or university in the U.S.

• Princeton in Asia Fellowship

Princeton in Asia offers approximately 145 full-year fellowships in a variety of Asian countries. PiA offers service-oriented posts in the fields of education, international development (NGOs), journalism and business, with a majority of fellows working as English teachers at universities and high schools. There is no citizenship requirement. Current college seniors and recent grads are eligible.

• Princeton in Latin America Fellowship

Princeton in Latin America (PiLA) is a non-profit organization that partners with nonprofits throughout Latin America to match them with young, public sector professionals seeking full-year fellowships in development work. There is no citizenship requirement. PiLA is currently open to graduating seniors and young alumni. Because PiLA is intended for young alumni seeking service opportunities abroad, they rarely consider applicants five years past graduation.

The Janine Gonzalez Scholarship for an MCAT Preparatory Course was developed to assist pre-medical students with the financial burden of preparing for the Medical College. Admissions Test (MCAT) required to apply to accredited U.S. Medical Schools.

<u>Sherry R. Arnstein Minority Student Scholarship</u>

This award recognizes underrepresented minority students attending one of the member colleges of the American Association of Colleges of Osteopathic Medicine.

• Summer Health Professions Education Program (SHPEP)

Summer Health Professions Education Program (SHPEP), funded by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and administered by AAMC and ADEA, sponsors free 6-week summer programs at 12 schools.

• ZendyHealth Med Tech Scholarship

The ZendyHealth Med Tech Scholarship serves to advance the field of medical technology. To be eligible, candidates must be enrolled in an accredited undergraduate degree program in pre-med, computer science/engineering, information technology, public health, nursing, or psychology.
